Context

Installation of a national seismic early warning system at station 100, St-Isidore.

Report

Natural Resources Canada is in the process of setting up a system to warn people of earthquakes across Canada. This system aims to record data caused by an earthquake and send alerts to people around the affected area. To do this, Natural Resources Canada requires a facility built on a cement foundation and floor and with access to electricity. Four (4) systems will be installed in the Prescott-Russell region and the village of St-Isidore is an ideal region for this type of system.

Links to priorities

We believe that this system is a good way to warn our citizens of earthquakes and it is a service that requires no effort from our employees. The contract is for a period of thirty (30) years and the system can be moved at any time to another establishment free of charge.

Financial Considerations

The system will be installed free of charge by the company. A slight increase in electricity costs will have to be absorbed by the municipality.

Recommendation

The Fire Department recommends Council accept Natural Resources Canada's proposal to install the National Seismic Early Warning System at Station 100. We also request that permission be given to the General Manager/Clerk to sign said agreement.

**EXEMPTION FROM PART LOT CONTROL BY-LAW
CORPORATION OF THE NATION MUNICIPALITY
BY-LAW NO. 130-2022**

"Being a By-law to exempt certain lands from Part Lot Control, in Registered Plan 50M363, on a Street legally named CHRISTIAN STREET, in the Nation Municipality and in the County of Russell."

WHEREAS pursuant to the request from LES HABITATIONS LECLAIR INC., it is expedient to exempt from Part Lot Control certain lands being BLOCKS 2, 4, 5, 7 AND 11, Registered Plan 50M363, on a Street legally named Christian Street;

WHEREAS the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c.P.13, as amended, (the "Planning Act") subsection 50(5) provides that all lands within a plan of subdivision are subject to part lot control;

WHEREAS authority is vested in Council of municipalities by the Planning Act, subsection 50(7) to enact by-laws which provide that subsection 50(5) does not apply to lands that are within a registered plan of subdivision as are designated in the by-law;

AND WHEREAS the Planning Act, subsection 50(7.1) does not come into effect until approved by the United Counties of Prescott and Russell;

NOW THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE NATION MUNICIPALITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- b) Parts 5 and 6 on Plan 50R11349 being part of BLOCK 11, ON PLAN 50M363 (part of PIN 69027-0836 LT), designated for the purpose of this by-law as Parcel "B"; and
- c) Parts 7 and 8 on Plan 50R11349 being part of BLOCK 11, ON PLAN 50M363 (part of PIN 69027-0836 LT), designated for the purpose of this by-law as Parcel "C"; and
- d) Parts 9, 10, 11 and 12 on Plan 50R11349 being part of BLOCK 11, ON PLAN 50M363 (part of PIN 69027-0836 LT), designated for the purpose of this by-law as Parcel "D".

6. That this By-Law shall come into force upon approval and shall expire on November 1, 2025 unless the Council of the Corporation of the Nation Municipality has provided an extension by amendment to this by-law prior to its expiry.

7. THAT this By-law comes into force and effect when it is approved by the United Counties of Prescott and Russell.

8. THAT this by-law shall not be construed as to permit the further resubdivision or severance of any such parcel.

9. Registration of this by-law in the proper land registry office is authorized and this by-law shall thereupon become effective.

READ A FIRST, SECOND AND THIRD TIME AND FINALLY PASSED THIS 1st DAY OF NOVEMBER, 2022.





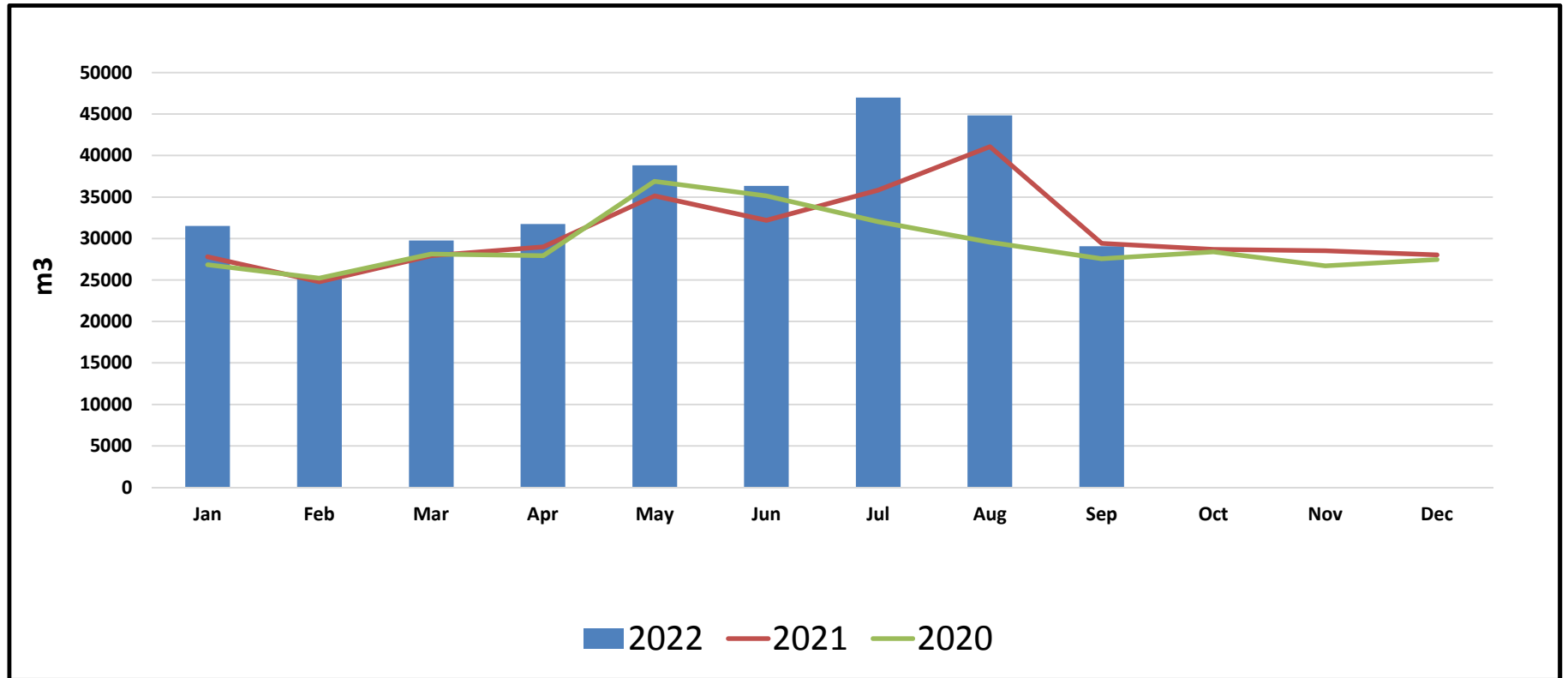

2 Process 2.1 Flow

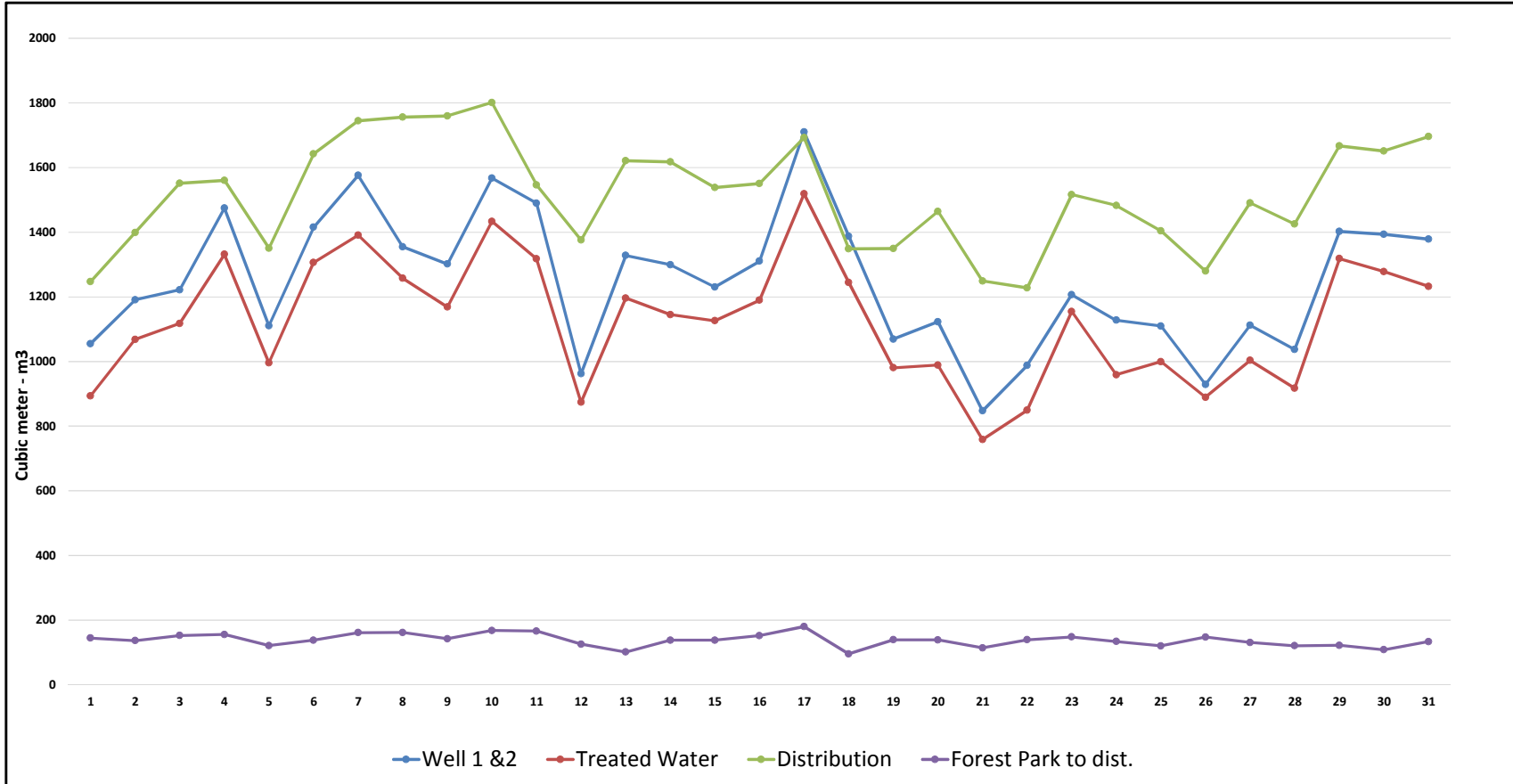
Table 1 - Distribution, 3 year historical data

WHEREAS the Government of Ontario, through the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, has introduced Bill 3 which is described as "An Act to amend various statutes with respect to special powers and duties of heads of council";

AND WHEREAS this Bill, if enacted, will initially apply to the City of Toronto and City of Ottawa, but will later be expanded to include other municipalities according to a statement made by the Premier at the 2022 AMO annual conference;

AND WHEREAS this Bill, if enacted, will give Mayors additional authority and powers, and correspondingly take away authority and powers from Councils and professional staff, and will include giving the Mayor the authority to propose and adopt the Municipal budget and to veto some decisions of Council;

AND WHEREAS this Bill, if enacted, will give authority over professional staff to the Mayor, including that of the Chief Administrative Officer;

AND WHEREAS these changes will result in a reduction of independence for professional staff including the CAO, who currently provide objective information to the Council and public and will now take direction from the Mayor alone when the Mayor so directs;

AND WHEREAS these are surprising and unnecessary changes to the historical balance of power between a Mayor and Council, and which historically gave the final say in all matters to the will of the majority of the elected Council; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Council of the Corporation of the Municipality of Wawa does hereby pass this resolution to petition the Government of Ontario that:

RESOLUTION

1. These changes to the Municipal Act, 2001, are unnecessary and will negatively affect the Municipality of Wawa;
2. That if the Ontario Government deems these changes necessary in large single-tier municipalities such as Toronto and Ottawa, that such changes should not be implemented in smaller municipalities;
3. That the Ontario Government should enact legislation clarifying the role of Mayor, Council and Chief Administrative Officer, similar to those recommended by the Ontario Municipal Administrator's Association and those recommended by Justice Marrocco in the Collingwood judicial inquiry of 2020; and
4. That if the stated goal of this legislation is to construct more housing in Ontario that this can be accomplished through other means including amendment of the Planning Act and funding of more affordable housing.

FURTHER, Council of the Corporation of the Municipality of Wawa directs the Clerk to ensure that a copy of this resolution be provided to the Premier of Ontario, the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, the "Standing Committee on Heritage, Infrastructure and Cultural Policy", MPP for Algoma-Manitoulin – Kapuskasing, Michael Mantha, MPP, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, and other Municipalities in Ontario."

Advocacy Update

Response to Strong Mayor Regulatory Postings

As many of you are aware, the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing posted two proposed regulations in support of Strong Mayor provisions (now included in the *City of Toronto Act, 2006* and the *Municipal Act, 2001*) and in response, we have submitted comments on each regulatory proposal.

Our comments are consistent with our previous [submission on Bill 3](#) presented to the Standing Committee on Heritage, Infrastructure and Cultural Policy in August. Comments on both proposals highlight the significant administrative burden that our members and municipal staff have taken on as a result of the decisions of other orders of government without consultation. Our comments also bring awareness to the uncertainties that remain for many municipal staff as a result of Bill 3.

AMCTO has long advised the Province that without providing reasonable timelines to implement Provincially-mandated changes to structures, governance or other matters, the Province continues to place undue administrative and operational burden on municipal staff who must implement these initiatives. These then become matters that require additional time and human resources to support – resulting in additional operational costs that municipalities must bear.

With these comments, we urge the Province to consider how the implementation of Bill 3 will work on the ground including its impact on local governance and operational matters, and already limited municipal finances, resources and staff capacity.

On October 25, 2022, our government released [More Homes Built Faster: Ontario's Housing Supply Action Plan 2022-2023](#) that proposes bold and transformative action to get 1.5 million homes built over the next 10 years.

The More Homes Built Faster Plan proposes policies and tools that reflect recommendations from the [Housing Affordability Task Force Report](#) and builds on [More Homes, More Choice](#) and the [More Homes for Everyone Plan](#). Our plan also draws on many elements from AMO's 2022 A Blueprint for Action: An Integrated Approach to Address the Ontario Housing Crisis and ROMA's 2022 Task Force Report on Attainable Housing and Purpose-Built Rentals. These changes are providing a solid foundation to address Ontario's housing supply crisis over the long term and will be supplemented by continued action in the future.

Our government has also introduced the More Homes Built Faster Act, 2022, and is seeking feedback on the changes proposed under the legislation and associated regulations. Additionally, various housing and land use policy reviews – including a housing-focused policy review of A Place to Grow and the Provincial Policy Statement, with a theme of supporting rural and northern housing – are being undertaken to identify and remove barriers to getting more homes built. These and other related consultations can be found through the [Environmental Registry of Ontario and the Ontario Regulatory Registry](#).

We encourage you share this information with senior staff in the municipality and to inform the newly elected head of council and council members. Our government is building a strong foundation for action that will continue to ensure Ontario is a prosperous and growing province – and the best place in the world to call home. We look forward to continued collaboration with our municipal partners to get more homes built faster.
